

Many thanks to Bennett and Arlene Paul, and team, for organizing this special meal. It's been three long years and we're very excited to break the fast together again! All are welcome.




T'SHUVAH, THE BIG FISH, JONAH AND ME: STUDY FOR YOM KIPPUR AFTERNOON

SECURITY AT TEMPLE BETH TIKVAH

The safety of our congregants has always been a major priority at TBT. Over the years, we have invested in deterrents, equipment, monitoring and maintenance of systems, and human vigilance. Now in the present environment, it is particularly in the forefront.



For the upcoming High Holidays, we have contracted professionally-trained private security, as well as the Madison Police. Thanks to a grant from the Arthur Eder Family Fund, in memory of Arthur and Yvette Eder at the Jewish Foundation of Greater New Haven, much of this year's expenses for our security will be covered. For the next fiscal year, beginning in July 2024, each TBT family will be assessed a small fee for security, which will appear on next year's dues bill.

HIGH HOLIDAY PARKING

Our volunteer parking attendants will direct you to your parking location.



- Arrive 30 minutes before services begin.
- Enter the synagogue via the NORTH driveway.
- Handicap access: Please arrive at least 30 minutes early and let the parking attendant know of your requirement. You will be accommodated to the best of our ability near the front of the building.
- Please do not block any travel lanes, entrances, or exits, as we require emergency access.
- Come in your smallest car. Consider carpooling!

The parking lot crew is made up of fellow synagogue members, volunteering their time to make your High Holidays safer and less stressful.
